

The Kinship Permanency Incentive Program: Support for relative and nonrelative "kin" and their children

The Kinship Permanency Incentive (KPI) program provides cash payments to children in the legal custody of kin.

Some kinship families will not be eligible for this program. However, it is important to find out what resources are available to your family. Contact your county public children services agency or county department of job and family services to find out more.

The KPI Program

KPI was created to support children in the homes of family or friends who have committed to caring for them when birth parents cannot.

Eligibility is available only for children you assumed custody or guardianship of on or after July 1, 2005.

KPI Requirements

A judge must have awarded legal custody or guardianship of the child to you on or after July 1, 2005.

Your income must not be higher than 300 percent of federal poverty guidelines.

To receive the cash payments, eligible families must apply through their county public children services agency and complete a family home assessment.

Other Supports

The child in your care also may be eligible for Ohio Works First cash assistance; ask for a "child only" application. You also may be eligible for publicly funded child care.
